Israel is soon to enter into the promised land – but before they do – they Lord reminds them of what they have been through. Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?"

Israel's story is our story. We are on that rollercoaster ride of life in the wilderness. We are currently living is that time between our deliverance from the slavery of sin and death through the water of Holy Baptism – and our entrance into the Promised Land of heaven.

And it's not always an easy life. At times, it's downright hard. And like Israel of old, we often find ourselves grumbling against the Lord – as if He doesn't care about us, or has abandoned us.

Like Israel – who had the audacity to say that life was better back in Egypt, playing it up by suggesting they sat around pots of meat and had a cornucopia of cuisine to eat – we play down what the Lord has done for us, and covet something else – or someone else – and that is very dangerous!

To despise the Lord, to reject Him and His gifts – and to look for something else, something other, something better – is to put our eternal life in jeopardy. And that is why the Lord tests us – disciplines us as a father disciplines his son – so that you will keep the commandments of the Lord your God by walking in His ways and fearing Him – as you walk through the wilderness of this world.

Like Israel of old, look back at all the Lord has provided for you – behold what He has done for you. He has delivered you from sin, death and the power of the devil through the waters of Holy Baptism. He has provided you food and drink and clothes. He has been with you always, guiding you through this life.

In the mist of all this abundance the Lord has provided – we grumble and complain. Sure, there is bread from heaven, but it's the same old thing, day after day. Sure, the clothes don't wear out, but they're the same clothes, day after day.

We forget how good we have it – until we don't. When the Lord disciplines us – when He takes it away so that we realize again what it means to be in need – then we are reminded to look to Him for help – to appreciate even the crumbs from His table – learning how to be content, and giving thanks.
